Leland L. Sheldon was born in 1883 in Monroe, NY. He married Emily Taylor in 1908. She passed away in 1963. He then married Edith Jones in 1964. She passed away later that year. Leland passed away in 1982 in Charlotte, NC. He was an executive for the Chrysler Corporation. His nephew Clinton Bayard Sheldon described him as a generous and kind person, always concerned about his fellow man.

Leland was a genealogist for the Sheldon Family Association and was the one to discover both libraries and Sheldon cousins with collections that possessed the original Sheldon Magazines published by Henry Olcott Sheldon a 2020 Memorial honoree. Leland was the one to transcribe that information onto the "SFA cards." His efforts also included reprinting the Sheldon Magazines. It cannot be understated that his work and correspondence are at the core of the Sheldon Family Association records. It is upon his shoulders that a long list of genealogists and researchers followed. They expanded and improved his efforts. It was E. Mark Sheldon (a 2020 Memorial honoree) who then took Leland's work and began the process of digitizing the "SFA cards."

Rose Marie Sheldon was born in Telluride, CO, in 1938. She married James Herbert Newton in 1961. He passed away in 2011. She then married Thomas Wallace, date unknown. Rose passed away in 2017 while living in Fort Wayne, IN.

Rose is another giant in the history of the Sheldon Family Association, whose efforts we rely on daily. My earliest finding of her participating in SFA research was in 1985. She became the President of the Association in 1986, serving in that role for ten years. She then became the SFAQ editor from about 2001 to 2011, where she transformed it from a newsletter to a research quarterly. She served as the SFA genealogist from 2004 to 2014. Rose was a critical part of setting up the trip to England in the mid-1990s. She was an excellent researcher and a prolific writer. Ultimately, she became the guardian of many Sheldon records. Concurrently, she was an active member of the Allen County Public Library. Genealogy ran deep in her soul. Consequently, all the Sheldon records she possessed and collected over the years were given to the ACPL in 2014 for preservation with more given after she passed.

Both these individuals typify a spirit of selflessness, sharing, and collaboration. They constantly yearned for improvement and forward-thinking. For their contributions and the passion they embodied, we honor them on the SFA Memorial Plaque. May we strive and succeed as they did.

Joshua William Shelden – A Civil War Soldier Part 2

Sheldon Family Association sheets on Joshua William Shelden reveal he was born on January 1, 1830, in Leeds County, Ontario, Canada. Joshua William Shelden and Eliza Jane Woolever were married in Porter County, Indiana, on March 28, 1852. The couple had seven living children. Joshua William died December 3, 1884. Eliza Jane died January 19, 1910. They are buried next to each other in Stuart Community Cemetery, Stuart, Holt, Nebraska. While the couple share a grave stone, Joshua has a separate stone marker provided by the military.

The Civil War Widow's Pension file for Eliza Jane Wolever Shelden primarily contains forms and letters to document that Eliza Jane Wolever Shelden was Joshua's legal wife and she was entitled to a widow's pension. Sadly, many of the supporting letters in the file are not dated and some are poor quality copies.

Confusion on Joshua's Civil War involvement was found comparing the information Eliza Jane provided to obtain a widow's pension and the information on Joshua's military cemetery marker. According to Eliza's documents, Joshua had served in Company B, 38th Indiana Infantry. The military marker seen on FindAGrave.com. shows the name Johna W. Shelden and shows he was a member of Company E, 4th Indiana Cavalry. Additional confusion to this research occurred in finding two men named whose names were sometimes spelled incorrectly and sometimes used interchangeably on military records: Joshua W(illiam) Shelden and Joshua W(illard) Sheldon.

A form titled Declaration for Original Pension of a Widow—Child or Children under Sixteen Years of Age Surviving was completed in Holt County Nebraska, and was signed before a notary public on July 23, 189_. Its declarations included Eliza Jane was the widow of Joshua W. Shelden who served during the late War of the Rebellion from 28day of September 1864, to the 23 day of June, 1865, as a Private in Company (B), 38 Regiment of Indiana. Further, he was honorably discharged from the service on the 23 day of June, Louisville, Kentucky and who died of cancer of the face on the 8 day of December, 1888, and she is without others means of support than her daily labor. The witnesses were Walter B. Armstrong and Anna D. Slaymaker

Author's Note: Anna D. Slaymaker (Newton) was the sister of Cornelia Belle Slaymaker (Shelden), my great grandmother who married Alonzo Charles Fremont Shelden. Alonzo was the oldest child of Joshua William and Eliza Jane.

A General Affidavit was completed in Holt County, Nebraska, by Eliza J. Shelden. She stated she was 55 years old and living in Atkinson, Holt Co., Neb. "That my marriage to Joshua W. Sheldon, was the first and only time I was married." (Undated)

Wilson Nourse of Bassett, Rock County, Nebraska, wrote an affidavit stating he was personally acquainted with Joshua W. Shelden at and before the time of his death and that he was present at the time of his death, the third day of December, 1884. The cause was cancer of the lip and face. Nourse knew this was as he was with Joshua every day for two months before his death and the attending physician made this known in a statement. (Pension Office stamp dated FEB 9, 1891.)

A General Affidavit was filed in Rock County, Nebraska, in the matter of the claim for a pension for Eliza J. Sheldon, widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, B, 38 Indiana. "Was acquainted with Joshua W. [] from May 1880 to the time of [] in Dec 1884, that said Joshua [] had a cancer on the face []the fact of my knowledge and belief was the [] of his death did not consider him an able body man during my acquaintance with him and the last two years of his life he was totally disabled to perform manual labor.

And that said disease was not contracted by any vicious habits.” Signed: Seth R. Bates (Undated)

A General Affidavit was filed from Jasper County, Missouri, in the matter of the claim for a pension for Eliza J. Sheldon as widow of Joshua W. Sheldon of B – 38 Ind. “Hav known JW Shelden and Eliza J. Shelden as man and wife []1857. Eliza J. Shelden is my sister were married to Joshua w. Sheldon in 1856 or 1856. he was a soldier in the Indiana Regiment from Porter Co Ind. I boarded with him for 2 years immediately after war hav not saw him or [] Shelden since Sept 1870. They were man and wife then I know he buried as her husband some 5 or 6 years ago in Nebraska. It was their first last and only marage. (am away from home and has no reference as to positive date of marage and death nor of [].” This document was signed by John H. Wolever and Mrs. C.W. Beeson.

Author’s Note: John Harrison Wolever was the brother of Eliza Jane Wolever.

A General Affidavit from Rock County, Nebraska, in the matter of the claim for a pension, widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, B – 38 – Indiana was filed by Albert Kemp – age 44 years. “was acquainted with Joshua W. Sheldon from Nov 1881 to the time of his death in Dec 1884, that that during this time he was suffering with a cancrn on the face which to the best of my knowledge and belief was the direct cause of his death. I did not consider him an able bodied man during this time and for the lest two years of his life he was totally disabled to perform any manual labor and that said diseas was not contracted by any vicious habits.” Signed: Albert Kemp. (Undated)

A General Affidavit from Holt County, Nebraska, in the matter of claim for a pension of Eliza J. Sheldon, widow of Joshua W. Sheldon “B” 38, Ind. was filed by Eliza J. Shelden, age fifty-seven, residing in Green Valley Precinct, Holt Co., Neb. (P.O. Atkinson, Neb.) “As shown by the discharge of Joshua W. Sheldon. Now in my possession and my own personal knowledge the above named soldier enlisted in United States Army Sept 24th 1864 and served until he was discharged at the close of the war. Also soldier was not in the military or naval service after June 23rd 1865.” Signed: Eliza J. Shelden with witnesses Frank Shelden and J. Elmer Allison. (Undated)

Author’s Note: Frank O. Shelden was the youngest living child of Joshua W. and Eliza J. Shelden. This document must have been written before September 1902 as this was when Frank died at age 30.

“that she is the widow of Joshua W. Sheldon who enlisted as private in Company B 38 Regiment of Indiana [] INFANTRY Vol enrolled 28th of Sep 1864. The name under which he enlisted and has always went by is Joshua W. Sheldon the leaving out of the W in the name was an oversight in making out the paper.” The affiant further says she has not applied for a pension prior to July 31st 1890. Signed: Eliza J. Shelden

A General Affidavit from Holt County, Nebraska, in the matter of the claim for a pension for Eliza J. Shelden as widow of Joshua W. of “B” 38 Ind., stating “That we have known Eliza J. Shelden for the past 9 years and know her to be the widow of Joshua W. Sheldon and further that she has not remarried since his death. And that she is dependant upon her daily labor for her support.” This document is signed by Sanford Whipple and E.C. Slaymaker. (Pension Office stamp dated FEB 9, 1891.)

Author’s Note: Sanford Whipple was married to Estella Clara Slaymaker (Whipple). She was the sister of Cornelia Belle Slaymaker (Shelden), who was married to Alonzo Charles Fremont Shelden, the oldest child of Eliza Jane and Joshua William Shelden. (Cornelia Belle and Alonzo were the author’s great grandparents.)

A form titled “Affidavit of Physician who Treated the Soldier in his Last Sickness, Showing the date and Cause of Death” was completed by A.A. Webster, M.D., in Rock County, Nebraska. This document states that it is the claim of Eliza J. widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, “B” 38th Ind. “I was the attending

physician at the time of the above-named soldier's death. He died on the third (3rd) day of December, 1884. The immediate cause of his death was cancer of the lip and face." ... "The above name soldier physical condition was at the time that I first commenced treating very bad as he could not perform any manual labor and suffered a good deal pain as the cancer tumor extended down the throat and destroying the muscles of the face. (Pension Office stamp dated FEB 9, 1891.)

A form dated June 20, 1891, was to validate the military service of Joshua W. Sheldon being "enlisted Sep. 28, 1864, and served as a [] in Co. B, 38 Reg't Ind Inf and was discharged at [] on June 23, 1865." The War Department, Record and Pension Division, Commissioner of Pensions replied June 24, 1891. "The rolls show that Joshua Sheldon mentioned in the preceding endorsement, was enrolled Oct. 26, 1864, and MO. June 23, 1865. The name Joshua W. Sheldon has not been found on the rolls of Co. B, 38 Ind. Inf." (Pension Office stamp dated June 25, 1891.)

A form titled General Affidavit was completed in Holt County, Nebraska, regarding a claim for a pension for Eliza J. Sheldon, widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, "B" 38 Ind. "Eliza J. Sheldon is possessed of real estate to the value of \$100.00 and personal property to the value of \$25.00. Income is only what she can earn with the assistance of her sons and so far as we know she is dependant upon her daily labor for her support and no one is legally bound to support her. We are knowing to the above from being afar neighbors and having known her for the past five or six years." This document was signed by R.E. Slaymaker and F. C. Balleweg on June 11, 1892. (Pension Office stamp dated JUN 18, 1892.)

Author's Note: R.E. Slaymaker was Reuban E. Slaymaker, the older brother of Cornelia Belle Slaymaker (Shelden).

A form titled Widow's Pension – Act of June 27, 1890 Shows claimant Eliza J. Sheldon, of Atkinson P.O., Holt County, Nebraska, was the widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, Private, Co. B, Regiment 38 Ind Vol Inf. Her form was submitted for approval on Nov 12, 1892, and was approved on Nov 29, 1892. Further, it was noted the soldier was not pensioned.

A form titled Act of June 27, 1890, shows Eliza J. Sheldon, widow of Joshua W. Sheldon, Private, Company B, Regiment 38 Ind. Vol. Inf. DEAD, was to receive a pension of \$8.00 per month commencing July 31, 1890. This document was issued Dec. 6, 1892, and mailed Dec. 14, 1892. There was a \$10 fee. (Stamped on the right side of this form was the word DROPPED with the handwritten entry of Mar 25, 1910. Also is a notation "Auditor advised of Death" with the date of Mar 31, 1910.)

A form titled United States Pension Agency, Act of April 19, 1908, Des, Moines, IA, dated Mar 25, 1910, reports information on pensioner Eliza J. Sheldon. "Sir: I have the honor to report that the above-named pensioner who was last paid at \$12, to 4 Jan, 1910 has been dropped because of death Jan 19, 1910. Check #398473 for \$36 dated Jan 17, 1910 forwarded to Auditor 3-23-1910. "

"Joshua W. Sheldon was 5' 8" tall, with dark complexion, gray eyes and dark hair. He was a farmer when he enlisted in Capt. Earlywine's Co. 4, Regiment Indiana Cavalry Aug. 7, 1862, at the age of 32. His enlistment was for 3 years, however, he became ill in camp on Sept. 22, 1862, with incipient 'phtuses pulmonalis', which appeared to have developed twice, an attack of pneumonia while in mounted service. There is a hereditary tendency to phtuses, as reported by his physician on his Certificate of Disability for Discharge dated 11 Nov 1862. At discharge, Joshua was a Private of Capt. Patterson's Co. of the 77th Regiment of Indiana Volunteers.

Joshua died in 1884 of cancer of the face and lips. He was a member of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.)."

Joshua W. Shelden enlisted on 9 August 1862. His enlistment rank was private. His muster in date was 9 August 1862 in Indiana. He was mustered into Company E, 4th Cavalry Regiment. He had enlisted. He mustered out 11 November 1862 with a discharge. He was a resident of Laporte, Indiana.

“The 38th Indiana Infantry organized in New Albany, Indiana mustered for a three year enlistment on September 18, 1861 under command of Colonel Benjamin Franklin Scribner The 38th Indiana Infantry mustered out of service at Louisville, Kentucky on July 15, 1865.

A roster of 38th Regiment, Indiana Infantry, Company B – Three Years Service, Indiana Volunteers, shows Shelden, Joshua W. mustered in on Oct. 26, 1864, and was mustered out June 22, 1865, and he was drafted.

“The 38th Regiment Indiana Infantry was an infantry regiment that served the Union Army during the American Civil War.”

Joshua W. Sheldon was born about 1830 and was 34 when he enrolled on 26 October 1864. His discharge date was 18 May 1865, in Michigan City, Indiana. He had been a member of Company B, 38th Regiment. Notes show he had been drafted and he was discharged at Louisville, KY, on May 18, 1865.

At least some of Joshua W(illiam) Shelden's military records have been co-mingled with the military records of at least one other man named Joshua W(illard) Sheldon. Both men have similar birth years, both served in the infantry during the Civil War and both have names that sound the same and names that have similar spellings and misspellings. Information on FindAGrave.com shows that Joshua Willard was

born in Vermont and was buried in Wisconsin. To add to the confusion FindAGrave.com also shows four additional men named Joshua W. Sheldon. Three of these men are buried in Sheldon Cemetery, Sheldon, Franklin County, Vermont. The fourth man was born in Sheldon, Franklin County, Vermont, and was buried in Pittsford, Rutland County, Vermont. Perhaps when the federal military records for Joshua William Shelden become available this confusion can be resolved.

“Joshua W. Sheldon enlisted and was mustered in on 20 September 1864, in Wisconsin. He mustered in to the 32nd infantry. He had been drafted. He was wounded on 3 February 1865, at Rivers’ Bridge, South Carolina. He mustered out on 12 June 1865 in Crystal Springs, Maryland. His residence place was La Crosse, Wisconsin.”

Gravestones were provided to Union Civil War soldiers who died between 1861 and 1903. While some headstones and some information of many Civil War soldiers can be found on FindAGrave.com, there is a collection of 3x4 cards documenting headstone contracts for deceased Union veterans. The alphabetically arranged cards are on 22 rolls of microfilm with Family Search and photocopies of the cards can be found on Ancestry.com. These cards contain brief information about each soldier. (On the card for Joshua W. Shelden, there are two errors; the death date and the cemetery name.) In addition to the soldier’s information, these cards contain the name of the contractor who made the stone. There were a variety of contractors including Sheldon & Sons of West Rutland, Vermont. Joshua William Shelden’s headstone was actually made by Sheldon & Sons. THOMAS SHELDON and the French & Indian War - Abercrombie (Abercromby) 's Army – 1758

The Sheldon Family Association record and descendants of Thomas Sheldon b. 18 Feb 1709 (South Kingstown, Rhode Island), d. approximately 1756 - 1758 (New York), has come under question.

This Thomas Sheldon who married Harriet Winters is S0301 in the SFA numbering system. His dates of death at Ancestry.com are stated as 1748 and 1750. He was to have been buried in the Pine Plains Cemetery, Dutchess County, New York (not noted in transcriptions). I am attempting to arrive at a more plausible date of death that would encompass the birth of his 11th and 12th child in the early 1750's.

While earlier records of the SFA may have been lost, some biographical notes remain on their genealogical system's database. One mentions that Thomas Sheldon fought in the French and Indian War as far north as Lake George, and another states he fought in Abercromby's Army, and died near the mouth of the Mohawk River (where it meets the Hudson River).

While I have been researching the details of Abercrombie's leadership, author of *1812, The War That Forged a Nation*, Walter R. Borneman has again proven himself as a respectful author of American History. In *The French and Indian War, Deciding the Fate of North America*, 2006, he summarizes well the account of James Abercromby (sometime spelled Abercrombie in other writings).

While William Pitt successfully chose Jeffrey Amherst as the British leader over the assault on Louisbourg, he was not so fortunate with what was ahead for Fort Ticonderoga. Chapter 8, Page 119, Borneman begins to describe how the decision was made to arrive at Abercromby, whose orders to command came on March 4, 1758. Even so, prior attempts to gain Colonial troops by the thousands failed, this new campaign attracted the new level of expected thousands from the New England colonists, including those from New York while Pitt had pledged arming as many as "...23,000 provincials." He notes, "Great Britain's North American colonies had finally been jumpstarted into a major war effort."

In July of 1758, the British forged an attack on Ft. Ticonderoga, then held by the French. Some six attempts in one day failed and while Abercrombie avoided danger by staying out of the range of battle, approximately 2,000 of his troops lay dead on the battlefield. Another account of Abercrombie notes that, as a result of his failures, he was returned to England in the fall of 1758.

While records of soldiers for the French & Indian War may not have been formally kept, somehow, prior researchers were able to ascertain that he (1) fought in the French & Indian War, (2) in Abercrombie's Army, (3) died probably serving under him and near the mouth of the Mohawk River, and (4) was buried in the Pine Plains Cemetery, although he does not appear in transcriptions.

He is my gggggg-grandfather. He and Harriet Winters had 12 children, some serving in the Revolutionary War (i.e. son Caleb Sheldon). I descend from their son Benjamin, and have participated in the SFA's DNA project. We have essentially identified our Colonial Progenitor's DNA marker, John Sheldon of South Kingstown, Rhode Island, and Thomas is in the middle of that line. Over the past 11 years, I have met quite a few "Thomas Cousins" realizing that his family gave way to a large tree of descendant cousins.
